3 SECTION MEMBERSHIP

As of December 31, 2021, the Manitoba Section had 90 members which is an increase of 12 members compared to 2020. The membership breakdown is as follows, with 2020 numbers given in brackets:

4 FINANCIAL REPORT

The Section's 2021 financial performance differed from the planned budget due to a number of factors. First, the Section did not make a contribution to the ITE Manitoba student chapter as planned, since the Student Chapter was unable to receive the contribution without a specific use for the funds. The Section also received a generous contribution to add to the Kean Lew Memorial Student Paper award of \$500. With growth in the Section, membership fee revenue was higher than expected. After learning from the impacts of the pandemic in 2020, the Section did not allocate any budget for monthly luncheons.

Overall, the revenue was higher than expected, primarily due to the receipt of funds for the Student Paper award. Expenses were lower than expected, primarily due to no contribution to the student chapter. Since the Section still has unallocated income and a healthy fund balance, we plan to offer value-added initiatives in the coming year to provide further opportunity to members.

5.1 Technical Luncheons

The ITE Manitoba Section endeavors to hold monthly meetings where members and friends of ITE can network, enjoy a lunch together and take-in engaging, relevant transportation engineering topics. Historically, these meetings have been held at the Winnipeg Winter Club with catering provided by Urban Prairie Cuisine.

Unfortunately, due to COVID-19, ITE Manitoba has placed the monthly in-person luncheons on hiatus until further notice. We look forward to returning to in-person luncheons at a future time when safe to do so, and in the meantime, we will continue to hold regular webinars and other events virtually.

5.2 Technical Webinars

Due to COVID-19, the ITE Manitoba Section was unable to hold its regular luncheon meetings in 2021, and alternatively held quarterly webinars in order to provide engaging technical content for ITE members and friends. There were four technical webinars in 2021, comprising 12 speakers total, with an average attendance of 40 people.

These webinars provide a means for ITE members and friends to view technical content from a variety of presenters on a range of relevant topics within one session. Efforts were made to organize the presentations based on themes.

These webinars were organized using the *Google Meet* platform and hosted by our Section President Steven Florko. Participants were encouraged to share questions and comments using the platform voice feature or chat feature, providing an interactive environment in the absence of an in-person event. In addition, webinars typically began with a short networking period, whereby participants were split into "rooms" for pre-webinar discussion and catching-up with each other. Members and friends of ITE attend the webinars free of charge.

Four transportation professionals discussed aspects of transit planning in Winnipeg including the details and background of Winnipeg's Transit Master Plan and the importance of equitable access to Transit for all citizens of Winnipeg.

- Kevin discussed the framework of the Winnipeg Transit Master Plan including data analysis, public feedback, and the focus around three key rapid transit lines.
- Graeme discussed the ongoing transition of the Winnipeg transit network from a mix of multi-purpose routes to a more organized system of primary and feeder routes.
- Bob demonstrated how Stantec leveraged cell phone and ridership data and community needs into the design of local and primary transit routes in Winnipeg.
- Teresa reviewed the key elements of the transit travel chain and the paradigm shift of public transit services available to the citizens of Winnipeg.

This webinar featured two presentations. The first presentation covered key design aspects of the Winnipeg South Perimeter project.

Richard and Don presented on the Winnipeg South Perimeter Project, which forms
the south link of the perimeter highway around the City of Winnipeg. The project
stems from a commitment from the Province of Manitoba to bring the highway up to
freeway standards, with 22 grade separations, including interchanges, river crossings,
and rail grade separations. This presentation addressed the challenges associated with
this project including project constraints, and concerns and desires of stakeholders.

The second presentation was on research in the field of public transit operations.

Sushreeta discussed research related to semi-flexible transit operations, including operational challenges relating to flexible travel demand and service reliability. The study proposes a methodology to optimize service headway, and number of requests accepted for curb-to-curb service. The research helps to support planning policies related to semi-flexible transit operations considering the interests of both operators and users of the system. With this research, Sushreeta was the winner of the 2021 Kean Lew Student Paper Competition.

Susanne discussed the importance of accessibility in construction zones from a legal, policy, and Equity Diversity and Inclusion standpoint. Morgan explained the ongoing developments to improve accommodation for vulnerable road users through work zones in Winnipeg.

The second presentation covered key aspects of the Wolseley to downtown walk bike project.

 Brian and Chris discussed the design process and engagement process for the Wolseley to downtown walk bike project, and the first phase of project construction in Fall 2021.

to the street or road may impact performance for each mode of travel.


5.3 Annual Business Meeting

The Annual Business Meeting was held on December 14, 2021 through *Google Meet*, in conjunction with the 2021 December technical webinar. The Annual Business Meeting included several items and updates, including:

- Summary of the Kean Lew Memorial Student Paper Competition.
- Review of 2021 financials and the proposed budget for 2022.
- Announcement that the 2021 ITE MB executive is acclaimed and will serve a second term in 2022.

5.4 Virtual Game Night

On March 9, ITE Manitoba hosted its first ever virtual game night. This game night featured the popular online game *Geoguessr*, the geographic discovery game where players are placed in a street-view setting and have to guess their location in the world using a limited amount of spatial cues. Some locations were easy while others were challenging, and it was a fun time for all! ITE Manitoba is hoping to host similar virtual game nights in the future.



5.5 Annual Fundraiser

Unfortunately, ITE Manitoba was unable to hold the annual fundraiser in 2021 due to limitations associated with COVID-19. Efforts were made to hold a fun in-person networking event in late summer 2021, but we were unable to go through with the event due to unforeseen circumstances. The annual fundraiser is a significant event for ITE Manitoba as it provides members and friends with a chance to gather for a day of fun activities and we have seen many successful fundraisers in past years. We hope to have a chance to resume the annual fundraiser events starting in 2022.

5.6 Website

The ITE Manitoba section maintains a website at http://www.itemanitoba.com/ to keep members informed about ongoing activities throughout the year. The website contains information about the section, contacts, and notices for upcoming events. ITE Manitoba events are also posted on the CITE website to make use of the online registration platform.

5.7 CITE Conference Planning

In 2020, the ITE Manitoba Section submitted a letter of intent to host the 2022 CITE Conference in Winnipeg. In early 2020, a Local Arrangements Committee (LAC) was formed and held its first meeting in February 2020. Later in 2020, the conference bid was put on hiatus. However, as of late 2021, the LAC is back up and running with the intent to host the joint 2023 CITE/CARSP Conference in Winnipeg.

The December 2021 LAC meeting is considered the official kickoff for 2023 conference planning, and the meeting covered personnel roles, potential conference themes, ideas for technical tours, and other things the LAC would like to highlight about Winnipeg during the conference. ITE MB is excited about the upcoming conference and a chance to showcase our great city!

6 STUDENT CHAPTER ACTIVITIES

The University of Manitoba is the host of the local student chapter to the ITE Manitoba Section. They continue to be one of the most active chapters in ITE, with regular participation at CITE conferences and international ITE meetings, including the Collegiate Traffic Bowls.

Highlights of the student chapter activities in 2021 are as follows:

- Four webinars in 2021 one in the spring and three in the fall
- Student chapter members attended two virtual ITE student leadership summits in 2021
- The student chapter gave virtual presentations on the topic of transportation engineering to three grade 7 classes at a middle school
- The student chapter held a bowling fundraiser to raise money for the Winnipeg Christmas Cheer Board

7 AWARDS AND ACHIEVEMENTS

7.1 ITE Manitoba Kean Lew Memorial Student Paper Competition

Beginning in 2010, the Manitoba Section's annual student paper and presentation prize was renamed the Kean Lew Memorial Student Paper Prize after Mr. Kean Lew, P. Eng. a graduate of the University of

Manitoba and former member of the ITE Manitoba Section. He was a friend of many of the members and tragically lost his life in 2009.

Requests for papers from students in the Civil Engineering program at the University of Manitoba are made at the beginning of the calendar year. Submitted papers are reviewed and scored by a panel of volunteer judges drawn from ITE Manitoba Section members, and the top three are invited to participate in the presentation competition. The presentations are graded by the judges and final scores are tallied. The winner is invited to present at a Section luncheon/webinar and is eligible for entry into the CITE Student Presentation Competition.

Congratulations to Sushreeta Mishra from the University of Manitoba, who was the winner of the prize in 2021! Thank you to Rebecca Peterniak for coordinating the competition, and to Diana Emerson, Walter Burdz, and David Patman for serving as judges.

7.2 CITE Awards

This year, Cassidy Zrobek from the University of Manitoba was the recipient of the *John Vardon Memorial Transportation Scholarship*, awarded each year to an outstanding student in a transportation masters-level program at a Canadian university. Congratulations Cassidy!

The ITE Manitoba Section facilitated several activities in 2021 including quarterly technical webinars, the Annual Business Meeting, our first ever virtual game night, and the Kean Lew Memorial Student Paper Competition.
